CONNECTION

Scaffold Your Activities and Lessons

Build up to complex concepts with stepping-stone activities

to grow their confidence.

- Give Students a Reason to Buy In

 Adjust assignments to provide choice or involve students with classroom responsibilities.
- Focus on Progress Over Achievement

 Create a growth mindset in students by celebrating victories besides A grades.
- Choose to intentionally learn your students' learning styles, preferences, and interests.

CONSISTENCY

- Set Consistent Expectations

 Clearly explain your expectations and stick to your classroom rules.
- Use Structure to Foster Engagement

 Don't leave students idle. Give everyone something to do with a clear payoff.
- Model the Behavior You Want to See

 Set the example for respect, empathy, enthusiasm, and preparation.

COMPASSION

Let Students Demonstrate Knowledge in Many Ways

Create participation options inclusive for all learning styles.

- Praise Publicly and Correct Privately

 Celebrate victories with the class. Deal with individual behavioral issues individually.
- Try Not to Take It Personally

 Don't let one failed activity steal your confidence in your teaching ability.
